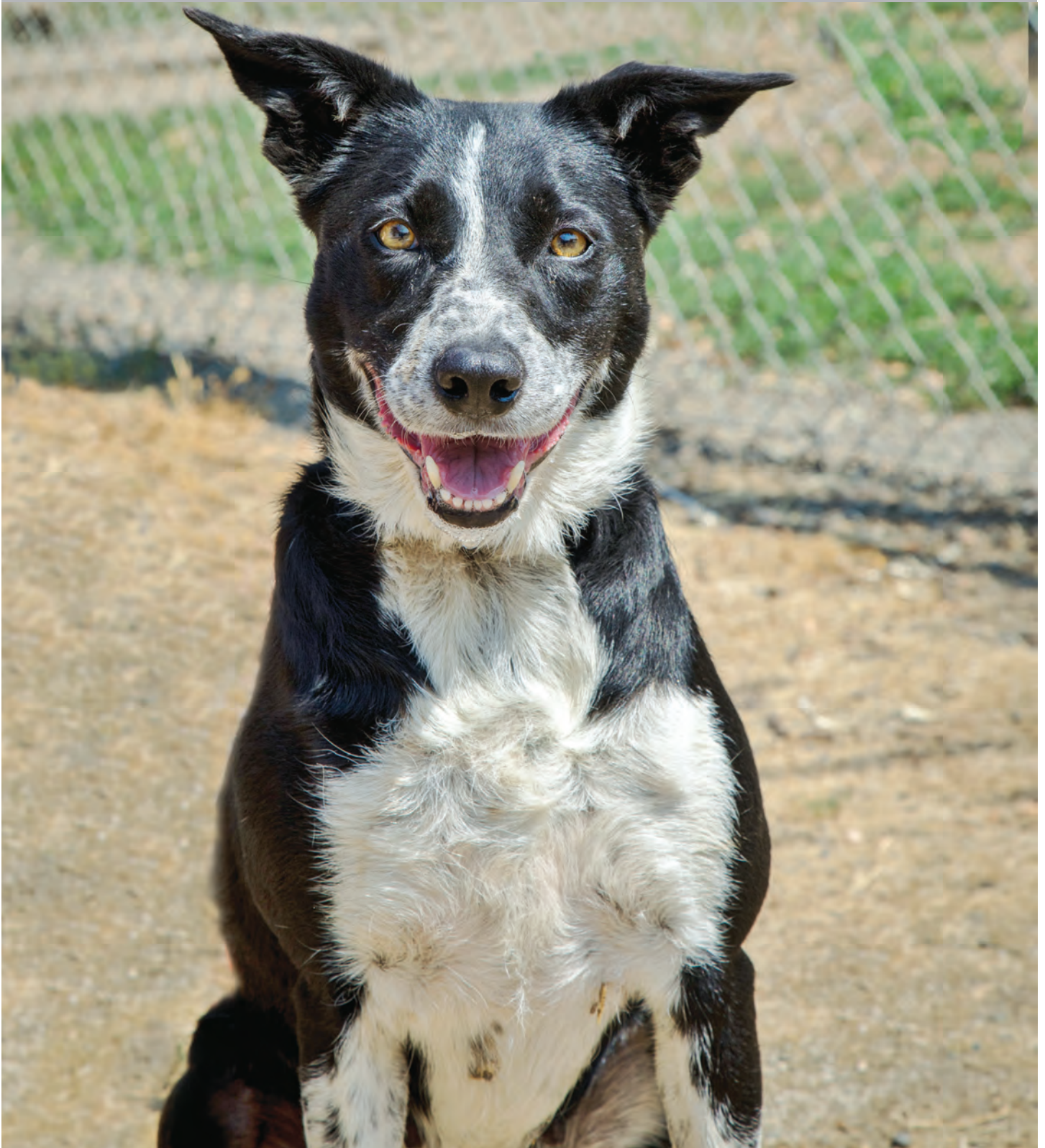

Since joining SoHumane in 2015 I have been overwhelmed by the generosity of the community we live in. It is only through that generosity that we are able to do our critical lifesaving work. 2017 has been an extraordinary year so far! Our Saving Train has been busy traveling up and down I-5 to overcrowded shelters saving precious lives. Together, we have found homes for over 900 dogs and cats that might have otherwise been euthanized.

Homeless pets arrive unwanted, abandoned, abused and neglected. At SoHumane they receive all of the love, time and medical care they need to recover from their difficult journeys and prove that every animal has a life worth saving. It's such a great feeling to know when they arrive here they are safe.

Thanks to your generosity we have also been able to provide more essential veterinary care for injured and senior pets than ever before. Many of the pets that come to SoHumane are in desperate need of medical and dental care. They are often in so much pain with dental disease that it is difficult for them to eat. Our senior pet adoptions are up 63%.



Although we are making a difference in our community and beyond there is still much work to do. Thousands of pets are being euthanized every day across the United States. As most of you know, spay/neuter is a big part of our mission. It's truly the best solution to our country's pet overpopulation problem and the needless suffering that results from it. Please support spay/neuter and encourage your friends, family and neighbors to spay/neuter their animals.

Together we can make a lifesaving difference for deserving animals who simply need a second chance. We can ensure all pets, including those with special needs, have a safe and warm place to call home.

There is never a time limit on how long animals remain available for adoption at SoHumane.

SoHumane save rates are among the highest in the nation at 97%.

Every animal is spayed or neutered before going home. Adoptions include an ID microchip, initial vaccines, parasite preventative, a courtesy veterinarian exam and plenty of post-adoption support.

Dog Park Safety

The dog park can be a wonderful place for your dog to exercise and engage with other dogs. It is fun not only for the dog but for the pet parent as well. Seeing your dog play with other dogs can be very enjoyable and entertaining. But what about all of the bad things you hear about the dog park? Is the dog park safe for you and your dog? Most dog parks have rules posted at the entrance but often they are overlooked. The rules are designed to ensure both you and your dog's safety. For this reason it is important to know the do's and don'ts of the dog park and to follow them every time you and your dog visit.

Make sure your dog is up to date on vaccines and parasite control before going to the dog park. This will protect your dog as well as other dogs from any contagious diseases or parasites. Exercise your dog before going to the park. If you bring an amped up wild dog to the dog park, you are asking for trouble! Perhaps walk your dog there to ensure your dog is in a calm state of mind before entering the park.

Keep your dog on leash until you are in the appropriate area to remove the leash. Use the designated size parks for your dog. Just because your Chihuahua does well with big dogs does not mean all big dogs entering the park will play appropriately with your dog. Large dogs may unintentionally injure a small dog or view them as prey which can result in serious injury or death. Better safe than sorry!

Please pick up after your dog. It is good manners, and it helps protect against the spread of parasites. Supervise your dog. To ensure the safety of all the animals, always watch your dog while they are playing at the park and make sure the dogs are interacting appropriately. If you are unsure what type of interactions are appropriate, contact a professional trainer.

Puppies are susceptible to contracting contagious diseases and should be kept away from dog parks. They can be targeted by older dogs and are at risk for being bullied by other dogs. Talk to your vet or a professional trainer before taking your puppy to the dog park. Your newly adopted dog is still adjusting to living in your home and is getting used to you. Use the first couple of weeks with your new furry friend to

work on basic obedience, find out what activities they enjoy or do not enjoy, and spend quality time with them at home before visiting the dog park.

Because of their lack of experience and small size, taking young children to the dog park can create a dangerous situation. Some dogs are possessive of food and toys. They may guard

and become aggressive when playing around other dogs. Time visiting the dog park with just your dog companion would be best.

Please do not use the dog park as a place to socialize an aggressive dog. The dog park is meant for socially stable and friendly dogs that do not have behavioral issues. If you need to socialize a dog, contact a professional trainer or behaviorist.

Never get in the middle of a dog fight. If dogs are in an aroused state or are fighting you should not get between them as this almost guarantees you will be bitten. Use other tactics to break up the fight like dumping water on the dogs to safely separate them. Consider researching safety techniques for breaking up a dog fight if you are frequently visiting dog parks.

Now that you know what to do and what not to do when visiting the dog park I hope you will feel more confident in your decision to participate or not in dog park adventures.



Pets and Holidays

The holiday season is approaching and will be here before we know it. Pets are a natural part of holiday gatherings with family and friends. As we look forward to holiday celebrations in the coming months, it is wise to consider how to keep our pets safe and healthy.

Any good holiday celebration centers around food, right? Many holiday delights can be toxic to pets, though. Meat drippings from feasts of turkey or ham are too rich for our furry companions and may cause pancreatitis. Bones left over from all the fixins' can penetrate the gastrointestinal tract or become lodged dangerously, necessitating emergency surgery. Chocolate, especially semi-sweet, dark or baking chocolate, can cause severe illness and even death. Xylitol, a sweetener used now in many candies, can cause liver failure in dogs in very small amounts. Most nuts are best kept away from pets. Despite being healthy for us, many fruits and vegetables are dangerous to pets, including garlic, onions, leeks, grapes and raisins.



It is also important to acknowledge other components of holiday cheer when considering the safety of your pets. For example, holiday lighting and wiring can seem attractive to pets and cause potentially lethal electroshock if

chewed. Batteries are extremely dangerous to pets if ingested. Keep ornaments and baubles out of reach. A previous patient of mine (a Labrador, of course), had to have a glass fire engine Christmas tree ornament endoscopically retrieved from her stomach! Tinsel is a favorite of cats and kittens and can become a GI foreign body, requiring emergency surgery. Holly, mistletoe and poinsettias can all cause nausea, vomiting and diarrhea if ingested. Burns and fires can be prevented by never leaving pets and candles unattended together. If alcohol or other recreational substances are part of your celebration, keep drinks and such away from pets. Ingestion of alcohol, marijuana or drugs, including over-the-counter medications or supplements, prescription medications or illegal drugs, is the most often reported cause of toxicity to pets.

Household guests fill homes with holiday cheer, but not all pets are keen to have their turf invaded. Remember to have your pets wear collars with ID tags in case pets escape when foot traffic is heavy into and out of the house. Encourage visitors to avoid feeding pets table scraps. Ensure that your pets have a quiet, warm, cozy spot to retreat to if they feel the need. Consider special medications to ease severe anxiety during celebratory fireworks. Travel can be stressful for pets, so plan ahead to help allay their fear, or consider leaving your pet in a well-regarded boarding facility.

We all want to spend holidays with our pets. With a little advance planning and special precautions, we can all do it safely.

When the Saving Train arrives at SoHumane, volunteers and staff gather to assist in the transfer of rescued animals. Animals who had run out of time now are offered a second chance at life.

Each dog is carefully moved from a traveling crate to a kennel set up with fresh water, food and a bed. Disoriented yet curious about their new surroundings, they peer out from the kennels. News travels quickly, and people soon come to see the new arrivals. An amazing collaboration between overcrowded shelters, SoHumane and people willing to offer a forever loving home has begun.

Many of the animals chosen for the Saving Train have run out of time at overcrowded public shelters. They may have been overlooked because of their color, or breed or passed by due to a treatable medical condition. Cats and kittens join the Saving Train when space is available at SoHumane.

It takes a lot of time and money to support these animals, but SoHumane believes that saving a life is priceless. The Saving Train is funded by generous people like you!

A Happy Cat Home

A cat's play behavior is similar to the natural predatory sequence of stalking, chasing, pouncing and biting. Cats enjoy "hunting." Opportunities to anticipate and explore are important. Encourage your kitty to play every day and reward behaviors that are appropriate for your home environment.

- Place perches and climbing posts in front of windows
- Scatter kibble or use a food puzzle toy to encourage "hunting"
- Locate scratching posts in frequently visited areas of the home
- Provide privacy with cardboard boxes
- Create a safe space with a bed
- Offer nontoxic cat grasses or catnip
- Water play with a fountain, sink or bowl can be fun
- Use a wand toy to safely burn off excess energy
- Clicker training and agility games offer both mental and physical stimulation
- Be sure to offer a treat or reward at the end of a hunt & catch play session



Reduce stress and boost your mood. Enjoy time spent playing with your cat or kitten.

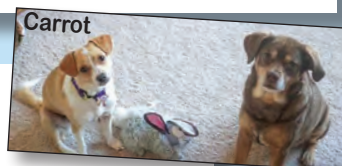

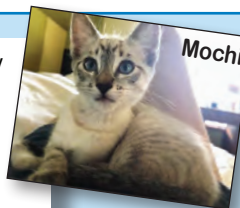

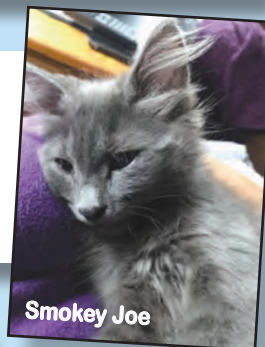
Just wanted to let you guys know how happy Rosie (previously Rousey) is! She is definitely a mama's girl. She's really very silly, despite being

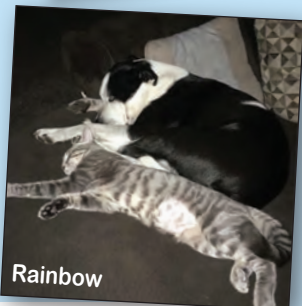

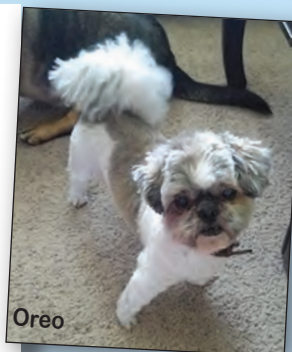
